2.1 Curricular Aspects: 2.1.1 Curricular Design & Development:	 The College adopts curriculum prescribed by the affiliating university Curriculum has been designed following national and global demands, by the parent university. The College caters to the integration/inclusion of ICT in curriculum of a number of courses such as Mathematics, Physics and Computer science
2.1.2 Academic Flexibility:	 The College offers 05 programmes and 05 courses in UG level. There is flexibility in choosing core and elective options. The College offers 03 self-financed UG courses. The College follows annual system. The College is yet to introduce CBCS and Semester system.
2.1.3 Feedback on Curriculum	The College obtains informal feedback on curriculum from students, alumni, parents, and academic peers, industries, parents and community.
2.1.4 Curriculum Update	 The affiliating university updates the curriculum every 03 years following guidelines of Statutory Bodies like UGC, AICTE and State Council of Higher Education. During the last five years, syllabi of seven subjects are revised. Curriculum bears some thrust on core values of NAAC and contributes to national development, global competence, primary value system and use of technology.

2.2 Teaching Learning and

2.2.1 Admission Process and Students Profile	 Admission process is given wide publicity through the prospectus, regional dailies, TV announcements and Banner demonstration at public places. Students are admitted on the basis of merit. Admission list is displayed in the College notice board for maintaining transparency. The College ensures equity in access by admitting SC (40.97%), ST (6.67%), BC (39.42%) and differently-abled (0.5%) students
2.2.2 Catering to the Diverse Needs:	 Slow and advanced learners are identified through their performance in unit tests, marks obtained in the previous examinations, assessments and performance in seminars. Slow learners are given remedial progammes and advanced learners are encouraged for project works/seminar. The College has provision for tutorial class. It has no mentoring system, but the teachers constantly interact with the students.
2.2.3 Teaching-Learning Process:	 The academic calendar provided by the affiliating university forms the broad basis of annual academic plan of the College. The teachers mainly follow lecture method of teaching. seminar, computer aided teaching are also conducted as part of teaching method in some departments. Faculty and students keep pace with recent development in the subjects by making use of the library and its
	facilities and by participating in seminars/ workshops

2.2.4 Teacher Quality:	 There are 09 permanent and 14 temporary/contract/part time teachers (out of 23 teachers), among them, 04 have Ph.D and 07 M.Phil degrees. The College recruits teachers through A.P.P.S.C where the candidates have to appear in a written test based on which interview is held. The selection is made following State Government, University norms and UGC guidelines. Additional faculties are appointed by C.P.D.C.
2.2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms:	The evaluation methods are communicated to the students at the beginning of the session and also through circulars. The institution monitors the progress of the students through internal assessments and marks obtained are sent to parents, in case of slow learners. The College has provision for redressal of grievance in examination as per university norms.

2.4.1 Physical Facilities for Learning:	 The college has a main campus of 6.04 acres of land with 24,333 sq.ft built in area. Twelve class rooms, 06 laboratories, administrative offices, library, gymnasium, seminar room, cycle stand, staff room, open air auditorium, common room for women.
	The college has a good Master Plan indicating existing infrastructure and future expansion programmes.
2.4.2 Maintenance of Infrastructure:	 There is no provision for funds for maintenance in the annual budget for land, buildings, furniture, equipments, computers and transport. The maintenance of the infrastructure is satisfactory.

 The Library Advisory Committee of the college monitors the purchase of books and journals, and looks after the use and security of materials of the library. The library has 03 computers and no internet facility. Internet and reprographic facilities are available in central computing facility. There are few departmental libraries. The library is partially computerized. The College has two well equipped computer laboratories with 30 computers, one of which is connected with LAN. There is budget provision for upgradation of computers and its accessories as well as its maintenance. The College has provision for limited
